

Mount Lawley Senior High School (MLSHS) continues to value and promote excellence in the arts through its Specialist Visual and Performing Arts (SVAPA) and Music Programs. These program pathways enable highly talented students to enhance their learning opportunities and encourage resourceful and inventive thinking. Under the guidance of inspiring teachers, many young lives will be enriched and help to create the next generation of creative thinkers.

The Lawley Art Auction, now in its 12th year, is the school's major fund raising event, raising funds in order to maximise the creative prospects of these students. Held annually the Auction represents a tremendous commitment and partnership between parents, business, community and school.

In 2015 we are proud to present over 90 exceptional artworks by 80 talented artists. We welcome back many professional artists from previous years and introduce new emerging artists, some of which are previous MLSHS students. Collectors and buyers can purchase from a diverse collection of artworks including paintings, prints, textiles, glass, ceramics and sculptures.

The 2015 Lawley Art Auction will raise funds for the music department to buy the equipment it needs as it settles into its new building. MLSHS offers an extensive Music Program with over 470 students currently studying music across the school. The program gives the students the opportunity to study classical, contemporary and jazz music and the flexibility, as they pass through the school, to determine the direction of their own music journey.

The SVAPA program encompasses the four arts areas; drama, media, music and visual arts and provides 130 students with high quality production opportunities. These include the annual presentation of the highly imaginative Year 8 Midsummer Night's Dream and Year 9 The Odyssey performances. Funds raised by the Lawley Art Auction enable SVAPA students to participate in morning enrichment classes and weekend workshops, engaging industry professionals to mentor the students. Funds raised also contribute to SVAPA students attending world class Perth International Arts Festival performances.

The Lawley Art Auction is jointly organised by the Music and SVAPA committees with the support of the MLSHS Parents & Citizens Association Inc. Our thanks go to the Principal and Associate Principals, school administration, teaching staff, parent volunteers and students.

Artists

Greg Ash



Greg Ash has been working in art glass for 13 years. In 2014 he won the Artistic Excellence Award at Tascraft, Australia's largest working craft fair. Later this year, he will be a featured artist in Craft Arts International, Australia's independent journal dedicated to contemporary craftwork. Ash's work includes kiln-formed fused work using WA themes in many pieces. Sculptural glass, wall hangings and cast work show a variety of styles. The vivid colour in Greg's work reflects the influence of Hundertwasser on his work.

John Baldock is the director of Alpha Studios Incorporated, a private art school currently offering courses in creative development and art therapy. He has over 50 years experience, as an artist, author, teacher, therapist and poet. John has held more than 100 exhibitions worldwide. He is the author of God Can Be Downloaded, won the 2014 Lions Club Art Award and the 2013 Hasluck Award.

Warayute Bannatee





Warayute Bannatee is a self taught artist from Thailand who has lived in Australia for over twelve years. Bannatee has won a number of prizes at various Art Awards including the 2008 Mandjar Art Awards and the 2010 Kimberley Art Prize. In 2012 he won People's Choice at the Mid West Art Prize and the 2013 Bassendean Visual Art Awards. Last year he was awarded Best Oil Painting at the Gascoyne Biennial Art Show and People's Choice at the Vasse Art Awards for Mobile Man 2. Painting is such a big part of his life.

Vanessa Black



Vanessa is a prolific painter, painting in many mediums. Two of Vanessa's recent exhibitions were held in the MANPC Alco Gallery, Mandurah and another in the John Holland Centre, Rockingham. She has held a very successful solo exhibition at Edenvale Gallery, Pinjarra and has won many awards in the Rotary Art Exhibition, held annually in Pinjarra. Deborah's spontaneous prismatic colours dance upon the canvas, reflecting a sense of positive energy, optimism, balance and harmony. Influenced by her Gija and Yamatji heritage, her artwork demonstrates the importance of place in forming cultural identity and in capturing and fascinating our imagination. Deborah has exhibited widely in WA, winning the coveted Cossack Art Award (Indigenous) in 2011. In 2014 she completed a Percent for Art Project, Healing and Wellbeing for the South Metropolitan Area Health Service. Through collaboration, she has created notable public artworks for the Fiona Stanley Hospital; the Munday Wall at Cooling Brothers; the Port Coogee-Beeliar Boodjar artwork for Australand; and Living Waters for Cockburn Integrated Health. Jillian Ciemitis is a multi-award winning photographer and printmaker with works in a number of permanent public collections both in Australia and internationally. She was awarded The WA Print Media Award in 2012 and has won numerous photographic awards. Jillian has participated in over 30 group exhibitions nationally, and numerous solo and joint shows and has been awarded various residencies. Exploring botanical and arboreal themes, the works in this auction are from a recent series dealing with 'Urban Trees'.

Pieteris Ciemitis





Peteris Ciemitis is a highly sought after artist, with works in the permanent collections of The National Portrait Gallery, The National Museum of Art in Latvia, and The Boesheng Museum of Art in China. He has been a finalist in The Archibald Prize twice and won The Black Swan Prize for Portraiture in 2010. He represented Australia in the Qingdao International Art Biennale in China in 2014. He has exhibited in over 50 exhibitions locally, nationally and internationally. Usually known for portraiture, Peteris last year explored the alternative theme of 'Urban Trees' and our relationship with them. The works in this auction are from that series.

Fine art printmaker, Helen Clarke, is inspired by the incredible diversity of the Australian landscape and the richness of its flora and fauna. It was her rural upbringing that was to influence her view of the natural world and later, to determine the course of her artistic career. Julian D Fisher was born and educated in South Africa attaining a Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1955. He began a parallel career as an artist in 1965. Julian immigrated to Australia in 1988 and here he soon established himself in the corporate gallery and art show worlds gaining many commissions from organisations such as Woodside, Wesfarmers, BHP Steel, Hong Kong Bank, and GEOS, Japan. He continues to exhibit nationally and internationally. Julian's work interprets subject and object within, creating orchestrations of form, colour and integrity. He employs depth and vision in his unique semi-abstract and expressionistic style.

Melanie Diss



Born and raised in the Swan Valley region of WA, Melanie has been a practicing artist since graduating from Curtin University of Technology in 2008 with a Bachelor of Arts in Visual Art. She has held three group shows, participated in many local group exhibitions and statewide art competitions. Melanie organised a joint solo exhibition at the Midland Junction Arts Centre in 2012 and was a winner of the North West Landscapes category in the 2012 Cossack Art Award. She contributed a 27-piece series to the Riverlands Montessori School Cubic 27 Fundraising Exhibition and was an invited artist at the 51st Darlington Arts Festival in November 2014.

Pippin Drysdale









Internationally acclaimed Fremantle Artist and Master of Australian Craft, Pippin Drysdale's career as a ceramic artist spans 30 years. Her passion for the craft merges with a love of landscape, which has travelled across continents and in most recent years focused on the vivid desert landscapes of Australia. Her works evoke a timeless and breathtaking sense of space and place within finely crafted porcelain vessels, narrating the mesmerising vastness of colour experienced uniquely in the Australian landscape. Pippin's works are included in major public and private collections in Australia and overseas, including the Victoria and Albert Museum, London, the National Museum of Scotland, and the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire. Recent solo exhibitions include Sabbia Gallery in Sydney, Galerie Terraviva, in France, PULS Galerie, Brussels and Joanna Bird, London.

Joanne Duffy



Born in Western Australia, Joanne Duffy uses her combination of a Bachelor of Arts (Design) and self-taught experience to depict the Australian landscape in an expressionist style. Her paintings draw inspiration from her childhood experiences of rural WA and the love of native flora and its environment. Joanne's abstract expressionist style explores her interests in our landscape and the emotional responses and memories it evokes within us. Her intense use of colour and sweeping brush marks create a sense of movement within her paintings. Joanne is a multi-award winning artist, winning the Art Award (Perth Royal Show) in 2014. Her work is held in private and corporate collections in Australia, Singapore, Germany and Malaysia.

Nick Economo



Nick began his career as an artist 40 years ago initially as a sculptor. However, for almost twenty years now, his focus has been painting. His paintings celebrate an extravagance of colour and texture, embracing an impressionistic style using a palate of strong, bold, thickly applied colours to produce depth and texture. Through his lavish, bold and liberal applications of material he continues to reference his first love, scuplture. Nick is particularly renowned for his lavish floral paintings although he does also create landscapes and abstract work using similar techniques. His work can be found in collections in Australia and overseas, including Europe, Hong Kong, Japan, New Zealand, Singapore and USA. His most recent award was 'Best in Show' at the Deloittes Cystic Fibrosis Spring Rose Art Show October 2013.

Neil Elliott



Neil pursued a career in graphic design studying at Perth Technical College. In 1990 Neil established a successful business as a cartoonist/illustrator. Seeking to explore and expand his boundaries, Neil trained in many fine art mediums including printmaking, photography, painting, life drawing and mixed media. With these skills Neil has created a style that is distinctively his. Neil's prime objective when painting is to explore and have fun. Bil is interested in interpreting the Australian landscape as both a personal record of its unique character and extending our imagination to create non existent imaginary landscapes of the mind.

Jan Heston





Jan Heston's work is a celebration of the power of fire on the earth. Fire has always been the means of transforming clay from earth into an immutable material of function and beauty. Jan's simple forms are the canvas to showcase the beauty of fire in that process. They are coated with many layers of Terra Sigilatta which are a very fine particle liquid clay slip, with each layer burnished to build up a lustrous surface further enhancing the effects achieved by the firing process. Fired at low temperatures to maintain porosity and to allow the smoke to penetrate the surface, Jan's pieces may be fired many times before the desired effects are achieved. After the firing, Jan waxes and polishes to enhance the colours and surface. The surface can be maintained by further application of wax and polishing.

Amanda Humphries



Amanda studied at the College of Fine Arts (CoFA) University of New South Wales, gaining a scholarship to study and exhibit in the USA, and graduating with a BA in Fine Arts. She completed a residency in Chennai, India in 2008. She has exhibited in a number of ARIs group and solo shows in regional and commercial galleries both in Australia and overseas. Amanda now lives in Perth and has been collaborating with Remnant Dance Theatre since late 2013, developing a multi-faceted production and art exhibition in Myanmar. She joined this arts' collective in 2015 and currently has a studio practice at the PS Art Space in Fremantle. Amanda's work was recently selected for the 2015 Chippendale New World Art Prize.
